## WHO WE ARE and WHAT WE DO:

- The Partnership for Water Sustainability in BC is a not-for-profit society.
- We are integrators. We play a bridging role between the Province, local government and community.
- The Partnership is not government, but government is very much part of the Partnership.
- For the past decade, we have been delivering the Water Sustainability Action Plan.
- We bring a holistic approach to LAND and WATER. We connect dots.
- The Partnership is facilitating inter-regional collaboration among local governments.

## **PURPOSE OF UPDATE PRESENTATION:**

- Provide an update on inter-regional collaboration with Vancouver Island local governments because:
  - The Province's approval of the Metro Vancouver region's Integrated Liquid Waste & Resource Management Plan included a requirement that Metro Vancouver will assist member municipalities to develop a coordinated program to monitor stormwater (rainwater) and assess and report the implementation and effectiveness of Integrated Stormwater Management Plans; and
  - The Metro Vancouver region's *Draft Adaptive Management Framework for Watershed Health* may be used as the starting point for evolving an inter-regional framework that works for everyone within the Georgia Basin.

## **OUR HISTORY WITH THE COMMITTEE PROVIDES CONTEXT:**

September 2011 – We asked for funding for Water Balance Model Express for Landowners.
May 2012 – We introduced the benefits of the <i>Inter-Regional Education Initiative (IREI)</i> for 'Rainwater Management in a Watershed Sustainability Context'.
October 2012 – We asked the Committee to formalize its support for inter-regional collaboration.
April 2013 – We recognized Metro Vancouver as a "Champion Supporter" of the Partnership.

□ Watershed health is a priority for local governments throughout the Georgia Basin.			
	A goal of inter-regional collaboration is consensus on a performance monitoring framework that can be used to adjust actions and inform community planning that maintains healthy streams:		
	•	<b>The Water Balance Goal:</b> After development or redevelopment, each site will function as it did before, or better.	
	•	To Protect Watershed Health: "Integrate the Site with the Watershed and the Stream"	
	•	The emphasis is on the 'how-to' details of implementation and integration.	
	•	Local governments learn from those who are leading by example.	
	•	Collaboration is the pathway to an outcome-oriented approach to <b>implementation and integration</b> within and between regions.	
	•	Everyone needs to agree on expectations and how all the players will work together, and after that each region and each community in a region can reach its goals in its own way.	
	•	Collaboration will accelerate affordable and effective outcomes within each region.	
	In June 2013, at a brainstorming session hosted by the Capital Regional District, a core group of local government champions representing five geographic regions affirmed that it will function as an inter-regional leadership team.		
	In July 2013, and as an action item arising from the June session, a similar brainstorming session with senion provincial managers explored the Province's role in the inter-regional collaborative process.		
	During the period October 2013 through June 2014, each region will host a working session with specific to the host region:

	The inter-regional leadership team has framed the ultimate outcome of the series of working sessions in these terms: "Through sharing and learning, ensure that where we are going is indeed the right way."		
	Metro Vancouver is planning to host Inter-Regional Session #1 because:		
	•	In 2012, an inter-governmental and multi-disciplinary working group was tasked with developing a weight-of-evidence performance measurement approach that would be available to all Metro Vancouver member municipalities.	
	•	The Metro Vancouver region's <i>Draft Adaptive Management Framework</i> would provide guidance for Metro Vancouver municipalities, so that they can report out biannually (to the Ministry of Environment) pursuant to the requirements of the region's <i>Integrated Liquid</i>	

deadline for municipal completion of these plans may be extended from 2014 to 2016.

The inter-regional process will serve as a feedback loop and peer-review that could potentially improve and/or enhance the Metro Vancouver region's *Draft Adaptive Management Framework*.
